ADVENTURE lover Annika Ferry was joyful as she photographed the sunrise from North Head with a friend on Wednesday, her father said yesterday. She died moments later.

Dr Jim Ferry released four images of his brilliant university student daughter admiring the dazzling sky moments before she fell less than 2m from a WWII bunker and hit her head. "Annika wasn't doing anything stupid," Dr Ferry said. "I wanted people to see the photographs of Annika at North Head to show the joy she was feeling watching that beautiful sunrise."

## Virus crisis grounds 6000 Qantas workers

MORE Qantas workers face the sack if Victoria's COVID-19 crisis delays the resumption of interstate air travel and plans for a "trans-Tasman bubble".

CEO Alan Joyce let 6000 staff — 20 per cent of the airline's workforce — go in what he described as the big-

gest crisis in aviation history. Scott Morrison said a plan was being developed to provide financial help to the airline industry beyond the end of the JobKeeper subsidy in September.

"To all of the Qantas family who will be hurting badly ... I extend my deepest regrets," the PM said.
